HOW IT WORKS

Bard Early College Hudson is a credit-bearing college program for 11th and 12th graders in Hudson and its surrounding communities in New York's Hudson Valley. The program is a unique partnership between Bard College, the Hudson City School District, Questar III BOCES, and the Galvan Foundation. Enrolled students spend the second half of every school day as undergraduates of Bard College, taking tuition-free college courses at a dedicated satellite Bard campus in the city of Hudson, NY. The courses are dually accredited by both Bard College and their local school districts, allowing students to move ahead in college without falling behind in high school.

STRUCTURE & SUPPORTS

Intensive College Counseling

In addition to their credit-bearing academic courses, all students participate in a weekly class called The College Experience. The majority of the College Experience course is spent helping students choose and apply to colleges that suit their interests and future goals. This includes preparing students for standardized tests (such as the SAT and ACT). completing financial aid forms, researching scholarship opportunities, and assistance with transferring Bard credits to other colleges upon acceptance. Bard Early College Hudson students are also eligible to apply for the Early College Opportunity scholarship, a full-tuition scholarship to Bard College reserved for students at the Bard Early Colleges.

Writing and Research Support

One-on-one writing assistance helps students understand and meet the standards of college-level writing. Our research training includes access to Bard's extensive library resources on the main Annandale campus.

Tutoring

Students meet regularly with graduate and undergraduate students from Bard's teacher education program. These older students serve the Hudson students as tutors, helping them understand college-level expectations and supporting their work on challenging assignments as needed.

APPLY NOW

Bard Early College Hudson will be accepting rising 11th and 12th graders for the Fall 2018 semester. Applicants will participate in a sample seminar class, followed by a one-on-one interview with a Bard faculty member. There is no minimum GPA requirement. We are searching for curious and engaged students who want to be active participants in their learning and are interested in taking on the challenge that a Bard education offers.
